

Principals Report

Friday, 5th December 2025



I really enjoyed the Year 6 Graduation Dinner held on Wednesday evening at the Hawkesdale Memorial Hall, and the celebration of the milestone that moving from primary to secondary school is. A big congratulations to Tommy, who was presented with the Kerrin Peters Award for his excellent classroom work, school involvement and friendship to others across this year - a very deserving recipient. It was great to have Frank Huglin discuss the tradition and history of the annual Kerrin Peters Award, and to present the award also. A big thanks to Mrs Whitehead and the Year 6 students for their efforts in making this event a success, and to Mr Hoeksema for the wonderful artworks that lined the Hall. Thanks also to our P&F group for supplying and presenting the graduation stoles, which were worn with pride by our students.



I also enjoyed listening to our prospective primary school captain speeches on Thursday, the results for which will be announced at the final Awards Assembly on Monday 15th December. Well done to Hunter, Blake, Rhyder and Logan for nominating for these positions in 2026, and for bravely taking on public speaking in front of their classmates. I look forward to congratulating our new Junior School Captains at our final assembly of the year.

Following on from feedback from the Strategic Review process earlier in the year our school timetable will be restructured next year to maximise teaching and learning opportunities at our school. We currently operate within a 30-period week, with students taking part in 6x50 minute sessions each day. In 2026 we will begin the year with 5x one hour period days, with students having 25 subject sessions for the week. One of the significant advantages created by this change will be to allow our primary students to have access to the recommended two hours of literacy instruction every day, as well as one hour of numeracy instruction every day. Building primary literacy and numeracy skills will translate to improved secondary literacy and numeracy skills as students move through year levels and will have the capacity to lift the academic performance of all students over time.



This will be very different way for our school to operate, and we will use 2026 to monitor and assess the scheduling of subjects to create the best model possible for future years. While start and finish times will not change in 2026, recess (Break 1 in 2026) and lunchtime (Break 2 in 2026) will be a little later, with 2x hour sessions happening before recess, 2x hour sessions happening before lunch, and then a single hour-long period happening after lunch to finish the day. I have included a brief explainer article in this newsletter with our new weekly schedule - please take the time to look at this so that you are aware of class timing changes for next year.

As we move ever-closer to school re-starting next term, a change to the primary class structure was communicated to primary families yesterday. Next year our primary class groups will consist of:

Prep and Year 1	Mrs Davey
Years 2, 3 and 4	Mrs Brown (4 days per week); Mr Gordon (1 day per week)
Years 5 and 6	Ms Whitehead

Tuesday 9th December is the Victorian statewide transition day; our Year 6's will be joined by new students from local primary schools to take part in two Year 7 transition days on Monday and Tuesday, while all primary students will step up to their new 2026 classes and teachers on Tuesday. This is always an exciting couple of days for students as they meet new classmates and teachers for the coming year and get to experience what it is like to move up to a new year level.



I was pleased to read two articles this week about past students and their endeavours after leaving our school. Jye Cromb was featured in the Warrnambool Standard and spoke about starting his own agricultural contracting business this year at age 20 - well done Jye! Shona was interviewed and featured in the December Hands On Learning national eNewsletter, describing how the HOL program helped her to become a local chef - well done to Shona as well! I always enjoy hearing about the pathways that students take after leaving our school, and these articles remind me about how diverse these pathways can be.

Our Year 10 students have been exploring their own possible future pathways this week, with local work experience placements happening across the district. As always, I appreciate the willingness of employers to host our students for this week, and the efforts of Mr Gordon in making these placements happen.

Ms Roney and Sam have been taking stock of our Library resources, and there is a table loaded with pre-loved junior fiction library books looking for a new home, just inside the Library foyer. **Students and parents are very welcome to peruse this collection, and to take home any books that they would like to - completely free!**



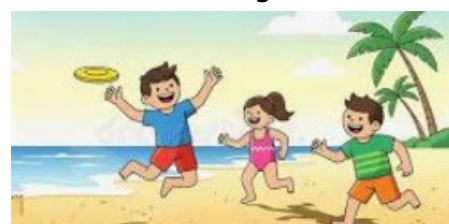
Please note that our school canteen will have a final opening day on Friday 12th December - this will be the last day for lunch orders and over the counter meals and snacks for 2025. The 2026 canteen menu will feature a wider range of gluten free food products that can be heated and served in protective packaging, and I would thank the canteen subcommittee of School Council for their work in assisting this to happen. ***While canteen staff will take all reasonable precautions to prevent the cross-contact of gluten free and gluten containing food products, it is important to be aware that we cannot guarantee that any item prepared and served from our canteen is going to be completely free of allergens.*** It is also worth noting that the gluten free food products on the new canteen menu will also be a little more expensive to purchase than gluten containing products. A huge thanks to Leanne and Vanessa for their work in the canteen this year - it's been a busy year of homemade food, breakfast club, delicious lunchtime specials and Zooper-Doopers!

A reminder that our annual Awards Assembly will be happening on Monday 15th December in the College Stadium, beginning at 2pm. Our assembly will be led by our School Captains and our staff Leadership team, and there will be a range of awards to present that will reflect achievement in displaying school values, academic excellence, citizenship and vocational effort. Parents and extended family are very welcome to attend this assembly in the Stadium, and to join staff and students for a whole-school sausage sizzle starting at 1pm near the Hands On Learning Shed. Please note that buses will leave the school at 3:30pm on this day.



Primary and secondary Picnic Day activities will be happening on Tuesday 16th December, with primary students heading to Woodford for some outside play at Jubilee Park, and then to Warrnambool for a movie at the Capitol Cinema (Years F-5) and some ten-pin bowling (Year 6). Secondary students will take part in the annual hike along the beach from

Killarney to Port Fairy for some beach cricket and supervised swimming between the flags at East Beach. Permissions and information about both days are on Compass, and it is great to see that many consents to attend have already been given; please provide permission to attend these days if you have not done so already.



Several pupil-free days are occurring in the last week of this term. Students are not required at school on Wednesday 17th December and Thursday 18th December 2025; these days will be used as time in lieu catch-up days or staff planning days for 2026.

And ... thinking ahead to the start of the 2026 school year, please note that all staff will return to school for a planning and preparation day on Tuesday 27th January, and that all students will return to school on Wednesday 28th January 2026. Office staff will be available for uniform sales at school on Friday January 23 from 10am - a great chance for families to try on and purchase uniform items before the school year actually starts.

Our new timetable structure in 2026

In 2026 our school will begin a new daily timetable structure, which will involve a 25-period week; students will attend 5 one hour classes per day, with a 30 minute recess (Break 1) and a 40 minute lunchtime (Break 2).

Our recent School Strategic Review highlighted some opportunities for improvement in terms of curriculum delivery, and the new daily timetable structure will provide a timing reset to allow these opportunities to happen.

Features of this new schedule:

- An increase in primary literacy and numeracy teaching time to a required 120 minutes and 60 minutes every day of the week
- A re-balancing of subject offerings for Year 7-10 students, with slightly less time for Humanities and Chinese, slightly more time for PE and Health/Respectful Relationships, and a much wider range of electives choices at Years 9-10
- Additional time for PE classes in Years F-10 so that minimum physical activity standards are being met. This will include one hour of combined Year 7&8 Sport each week with three teachers working with smaller groups, and a compulsory Sport elective for Year 9-10 students
- Hour-long sessions that will provide extra time for sustained reading, writing, practical work or problem-solving across all year levels
- Creating consistency and predictability with class length over the course of each day, with students and teachers knowing that each lesson has a full hour available.

Music will still be used as a prompt for students to move straight to classes, and will occur at 9:08am, 11:38am and 2:18pm. The music will signal the start of the last two minutes of Break 1 and 2.

Break times will be a little later than they are this year, and students will benefit from having more substantial food to eat following the first two hours of the day (Break 1 will be at 11:10am to 11:40am) and snacks after the fourth hour of the day (Break 2 will be at 1:40pm to 2:20pm). The canteen will reorganise its food offerings to match this next year.

This is a good initial starting point for communicating this move to a new weekly schedule in 2026 – I'll include more information about subject organisation within this structure in next week's newsletter. I'm happy to answer queries about this change, so feel free to contact me at school if you would like to talk any of the implications of this new schedule through.

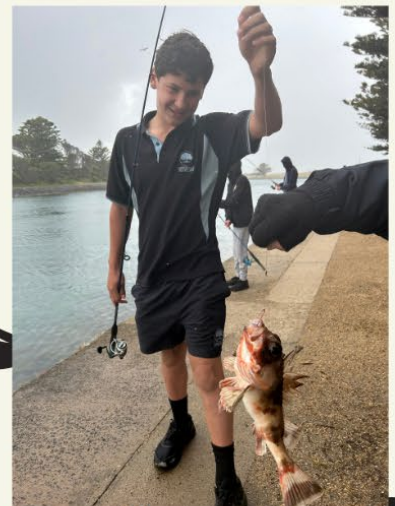

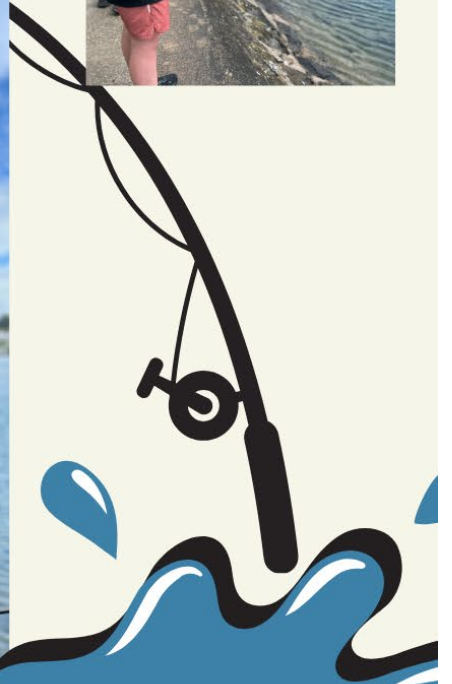
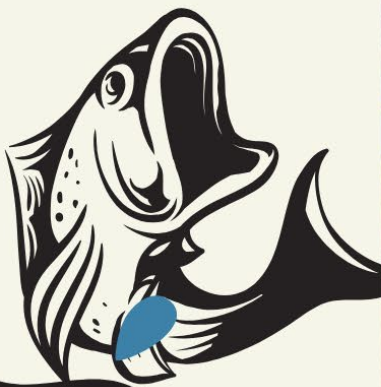
Charlotte has been volunteering for the local CWA,

YEAR 7 & 8 ART

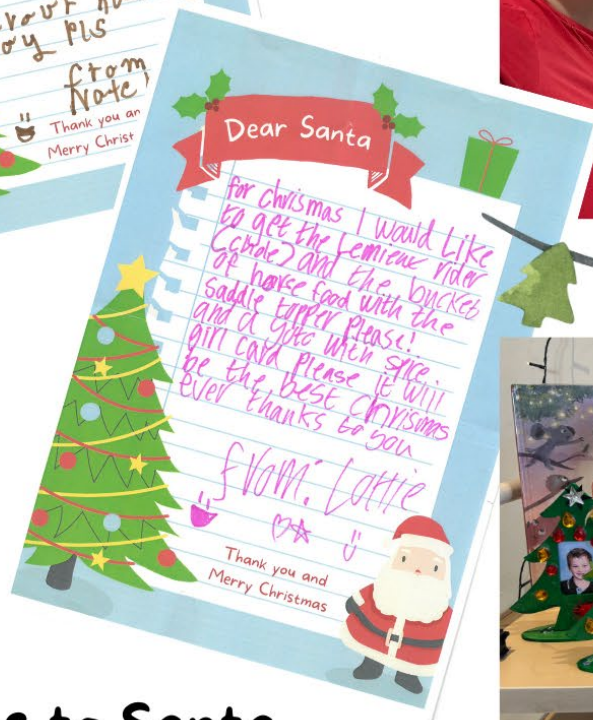

From 10 December 2025, new laws will take effect in Australia to protect young people online by restricting access to social media for those under the age of 16. This important change reflects growing community concern about the impact of early social media use on children's mental health, wellbeing and development.

Research shows that social media can expose children to unrealistic comparisons, online pressure and harmful content long before they are emotionally ready to manage it. While regulation is a positive step forward, real safety begins at home. Families continue to play the most powerful role in helping children build confidence, resilience and awareness in the digital world.

These new regulations provide an opportunity to talk openly with your child about their online experiences and what these changes mean for them. It's also a chance to review family technology habits, reinforce healthy routines, and explore age-appropriate ways for young people to connect, learn and express themselves.

This Special Report explains what the new laws mean in practice and offers practical guidance to help families prepare for the upcoming changes.
